# **ARTS AND CULTURE SUSTAINABILITY FUNDS**

*February 2022 Intake*

## Introduction

In 2021-2022 the Manitoba Government invested \$12 million to help sustain the arts and cultural sector as it grappled with challenges brought on by the COVID-19 pandemic. The \$12 million was delivered through two rounds of funding. This report details the \$5,480,380 of the second round of funding delivered by the Manitoba Arts Council through reopening two programs developed in the first funding round.

- **Arts and Culture Sustainability Fund (ACSF)** for organizations.
- **Adapt** for individuals and groups.

These two programs were announced to the arts and culture sector on February 2, 2022. Applications opened on February 7, 2022 and were due by February 28, 2022.

167 eligible applications to the ACSF for organizations were received. These requests totalled \$6.6 million.

168 eligible applications to the Adapt program for individuals and groups were received. These requests totalled \$1.6 million.

## Arts and Culture Sustainability Fund (for Organizations)

Program guidelines stated that awards would be based on approximately 5% of an organization's annual revenues to a maximum of \$300,000. In determining grant amounts, consideration was given to organizations that did not receive support from the first round of the Arts and Culture Sustainability funds and that demonstrated a robust approach to meeting the program goals.

### 1. Program Details

Below are the program guidelines, assessment methodology, and award amount details for the Arts and Culture Sustainability Fund.

#### Goals

- Sustainability
- Safe Reopening
- Community Impact

#### Review/assessment methodology

1. Applications were reviewed for eligibility.
2. Financial data was verified for accuracy against previous applications to MAC and/or Registered Charities information.
3. Applications were assessed for alignment with program goals. 26 organizations were determined to have a "robust" approach to program goals.

#### Award amount determination

- No award greater than \$300,000
- No award greater than the requested amount
- Base amount of 4.35% of annual revenues (average of three years)
- +.5% if determined to have a robust approach to program goals.
- +.5% if the organization did not receive Round 1 support.

#### Reporting

Grant recipients were to use awarded funds and report on the project by March 31, 2023.

## 2. Impact of the pandemic on award recipients' revenue

Of the 167 organizations that received support from this second intake of the arts and cultural sustainability fund, 130 also received support at the first funding intake. 37 organizations received support only at this second intake, while 36 organizations that received support at the first intake did not apply again.

Of these 167 organizations 128 had pre-pandemic annual revenues of over \$60K while 39 had pre-pandemic annual revenues under \$60K.

The Manitoba Arts Council required the 128 organizations with annual revenues over \$60K to provide revenue data for five fiscal years: two pre-pandemic years, one in the year the pandemic started, and two pandemic years. To make the application less onerous and commensurate with the organization's size, the organizations with annual revenues under \$60K were required to provide average revenues for two pre-pandemic years, the average for both 2020<sup>1</sup> and 2021, and a full year for 2022.

In this report we are comparing one full pre-pandemic fiscal year (2019) and two full pandemic fiscal years (2021 and 2022).

### Organizations with revenues over \$60K


In comparing the average revenues of the 128 organizations with revenues over \$60K for 2019, 2021, and 2022, the following is true:

- **Total revenues** decreased by \$28,619,935 (-23%) in 2021 compared to 2019. The following year, though the total revenues went up by \$26,166,379 compared to 2021, there was still a loss of total revenues of \$2,453,556 compared to the pre-pandemic year.
- **Earned revenues** decreased by \$35,593,957 (-63%) in 2021 compared to 2019. In 2022 the decrease was smaller but still significant at \$23,564,861 (-42%) compared to 2019.
- **Private sector revenues** decreased by \$3,305,129 (-17%) in 2021 compared to 2019. The loss experienced between 2019 and 2021 was eliminated in 2022 when private revenue surpassed the 2019 amount by \$1,197,968.
- **Public sector revenues** from the federal and provincial governments increased by \$10,677,388 (+27%) in 2021 compared to 2019. This was primarily in the form of COVID relief funds. They also increased by \$19,483,405 in 2022 compared to 2019. This was an increase of \$8,806,017 compared to the previous year.

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<sup>1</sup>Each year refers to an organisation's fiscal year. The fiscal year ends in the referenced year.

These 128 organizations received \$4,657,100 from the second round of the Arts and Cultural Sustainability Fund. This accounted for 24% of the additional public sector revenues they received in 2022.



To summarize the above chart, organizations with a budget over \$60K that received support through ACSF saw their earned revenue decrease drastically during the pandemic.

In 2021, the decrease in earned revenue was \$35,593,957 (-63%) compared to 2019. In 2022, the decrease in earned revenue was \$23,950,147 (-42%) also compared to 2019. This reflects a gradual return of activity and audiences as pandemic restrictions began to ease. Government COVID-19 support was critical to offset the steep decline of earned revenues for these arts and culture organizations.


An increase in public support of \$10,677,388 in 2021 compared to 2019, and an increase of \$19,483,405 in 2022 compared to the same year allowed these organizations to remain viable as they weathered the unprecedented challenges of the pandemic.

### **Organizations with revenues under \$60K**

In comparing the average revenues of the 39 organizations with revenues under \$60K for 2019, 2021, and 2022, the following is true:

- **Total revenues** decreased by \$60,932 (-5%) in 2021 compared to the pre-pandemic year. In 2022, the total revenue increased by \$20,122 (+2%) compared to 2019.
- **Earned revenues** decreased by \$239,375 (-47%), in 2021 compared to the pre-pandemic year. In 2022, they decreased by \$172,166 (-34%) compared to 2019.
- **Private sector revenues** increased by \$3,488 (+2%) in 2021 compared to the pre-pandemic year. They continued to increase in 2022 by \$9,349 (+6%) compared to 2019.
- **Public sector revenues** COVID relief funds from the federal and provincial governments increased by \$233,541 (+54%) in 2021 compared to the pre-pandemic year. They continued to increase in 2022 by \$233,392 (+52%) compared to 2019.

These 39 organizations received \$117,900 from the second round of Arts and Cultural Sustainability Fund. This accounted for 68% of the additional public sector revenues they received in 2022.



To summarize the above chart, organizations that received support through ACSF with a budget under \$60K saw their earned revenue decrease considerably during the pandemic years. The increase in public revenue helped offset these losses.

In the end, these organizations only saw a decrease in their total revenue of approximately 5% in 2021 and 4% in 2022.

### 3. Areas of spending

Through the second cycle of the Arts and Cultural Sustainability Fund program, \$4,774,000 was awarded to 167 organizations.


The organizations which received ACSF funds primarily invested in human resources. This was an essential factor in maintaining the continuity of artistic and cultural activities during and after the pandemic and allowed organizations to retain the sector's most precious resource – its people.

This translates into 49% of ACSF funding being spent on **paying wages and professional fees**. This includes:

- 25% on retaining staff and freelance workers.
- 21% on hiring new staff and freelance workers.
- 3% on rehiring staff and freelance workers that were laid off.

Organizations reported that 1,311 people were paid with these monies for a total of 133,613 working hours.

The remaining funding was spent more or less equally between adapting operations (22%) and stabilizing their organizations (19%). Spending on implementing health measures decreased compared to 2021 due to the ease of restrictions tied to COVID.



The organizations also reported:



123 organizations used the grant or part of it to pay **wages and professional fees**.



86 organizations used the grant or part of it to **stabilize their organization's** finances by paying for rent, mortgage, insurance, taxes, and utilities.



86 organizations used the grant or part of it to **implement health measures** and safely restore services by purchasing PPE, improving cleaning and disinfection, supporting mental health and well-being, and investing in equipment.



105 organizations used the grant or part of it to adapt the **organization's operations** by investing in new directions for organizations and developing new methods for creating, presenting, and distributing their work

## Adapt (for Individuals and Groups)

The Adapt program was intended to support applicants who were expanding their skills and choosing bold new directions for their art in response to the challenges brought on by COVID-19. Applications must have made clear how the project will increase one's ability to sustain one's practice in the future.

### 1. Program details

Below are the program guidelines, assessment methodology, and award amount details for the Arts and Culture Sustainability Fund.

#### Goals

- Skills development
- Sustainability
- Impact on applicant's practice

#### Review/assessment methodology

1. 174 applications were received and reviewed for eligibility
2. Applications were assessed for alignment with program goals. Scores ranged from 4.77 to 2.91 (out of 5).

#### Award decisions

- No award would be greater than \$10,000.
- 79 awards were recommended for funding, totalling \$705,380. The cut off to receive funding was a score of 3.96 (out of 5).
- 95 applications were declined for a 45% success rate.


#### Reporting

Grant recipients were to use and report on the use of awarded funds by March 31, 2023.

## 2. Areas of spending

At the time of this writing, 70 of 79 final reports have been received for grants awarded through the Adapt program. This accounts for \$619,218 of the total awarded amount. Of this, 65% went to fees for 233 individuals for a total of 10,775 working hours.

24% of the remaining grant monies went to production costs with the balance spent on administration, travel, research and professional development.
